## Our Founding Organisation

Hand in Hand India, our founding organisation, was registered in 2004.

The organisation's roots can be traced to the vision of eradicating child labour in Kancheepuram, a district in Tamil Nadu, India, known for its 500-year-old silk weaving industry. What began as a focus on one thematic area has significantly expanded into five major thematic areas, namely, Child Labour Elimination and Education Programme, Women Empowerment and Job Creation, Access to Affordable Healthcare, Skill Development & Technology Centres, and the Environment (Natural Resource Management and Sustainable Waste Management). Hand in Hand India now works in 20 states in India, and our global presence can be traced in 9 countries spread over 3 continents.

## Hand in Hand Switzerland's Approach

For creating an equal, sustainable and prosperous world, we strongly believe that the primary focus on a 3E approach is of utmost importance:

- Education
- Empowerment
- Environment
- Dream Village (Village Uplift Programme)

**Education:** We engage with vulnerable children and youth from remote and rural areas and provide them with access to quality education and opportunities through our residential and non-residential programmes, which are holistic in nature.

**Empowerment:** We believe that women can be the powerhouse of change and thereby financially empower women from rural communities through our Self Help Group-Micro Enterprises programme so they can become self-sufficient entrepreneurs and bring about social change.

**Environment:** We create climate-resilient communities through large-scale environment initiatives that focus on climate-smart agriculture and waste management programmes, with major emphasis on marginal farmers, water conservation, waste segregation, and knowledge dissemination

**Dream Village:** Directly addressing poverty, our 30-month Dream Village programme elevates rural spaces by improving social indicators of environment, education, and empowerment through a community-oriented participatory approach leading to sustainability.

# EVENTS

## Fireside Chat

Hand in Hand Switzerland hosted the 'Fireside Chat' on 20 November 2024 at Impact Hub in Geneva. The event focused on three topics, namely 'Empowering Women,' 'Educating Futures,' and 'Elevating our Planet.' A women-led panel discussion led by three eminent speakers, Ms. Pritha Mani, Ms. Blerina Zoto, and Ms. Pavitra Raja, and moderated by Mr. Sandip Mookerjee, was at the heart of this event. The programme's schedule was divided into two segments: the first focusing on the panel discussion and Q&A, while the second featured a networking session to meet like-minded individuals.

The panel discussion, as well as views alongside questions from programme attendees in the first half of the event, covered subjects such as childhood habits and trauma, women and microfinance, and businesses and the environment, enabling a dive into the thematic areas of 'Education,' 'Empowerment,' and our 'Environment.' The session helped bring to light the vital role of community involvement in tackling societal issues. This formal interaction laid the foundation for the next portion of the event, the networking session, in which the exchange of views in an informal setup furthered the ideation process and helped strengthen connections. Our guest speakers, event participants, and the organising team were integral to this event's success.

# ONGOING PROJECTS





## Securing Young Lives from Flames

**Supported by:** JYLAG Foundation & J&K Wonderland Foundation

**Location:** Tamil Nadu, India

In the year 2023, JYLAG Foundation collaborated with Hand in Hand Switzerland and Hand in Hand India under the project titled 'Saving Young Lives from Flames,' a child labour elimination programme in India. Implemented in Sivakasi, a place famous for the firecracker industry, the project was undertaken for a period of 2 years.

The impact of the project has been significant and diverse, addressing key issues related to child rights, education, and youth empowerment. It is also important to point out that through awareness meetings on 'Child Rights and Protection,' the project reached a substantial number of 10,043 key stakeholders, disseminating crucial information and fostering a deeper understanding of the rights and protection of children within the community, thereby laying the foundation for building a supportive environment where child rights are acknowledged and upheld by a wide range of stakeholders. All in all, the project's holistic approach to addressing child rights, education, and youth empowerment reflects a commitment to creating a more inclusive, supportive, and safe environment for children and youth to thrive and realise their potential.

## Impact

- Re-educating 114 child labourers (ages 6-14) and preventing further recruitment in hazardous work environments by running 'Non-Residential Schools'
- Enrolling 647 children (ages 6-14) back into regular school via 'Social Mobilisation' programmes
- Assuring 104 young people (ages 15-18) complete their high schooling (10th grade) through the 'Transit School' programme
- Increasing safe work environments for 100 youth (ages 15-18) through vocational skill training



## CASE Study

Mari Lakshmi, a 12-year-old residing in Sivakasi, was found as a child labourer working to alleviate her family's financial struggles. Her mother, Bathirakkali, also toiled as a daily wage worker, while her father, Muthuraj, battled alcohol addiction, contributing to the family's misery.

As part of this project, it was discovered by field workers during social mobilisation that Mari Lakshmi had dropped out of school, and through persistent group motivation involving elected representatives, local government officials, and community leaders, the importance of education was communicated to her and her parents. After several stages of persuasion, her family agreed to enrol Mari Lakshmi in the Anaiyur Non-Residential Special Training Centre and subsequently back into a government school. Presently, Mari Lakshmi is excelling academically and aspires to become a police officer, reflecting her newfound determination.



## **Strengthening Rural Women's Livelihoods for Sustainable Economic Development in Cambodia**

**Supported by:** City of Geneva, Rosalynd Foundation, UTIL Stiftung, Bellevue, Onex, Meyrin & SIG

**Location:** Kratie, Cambodia

Hand in Hand Cambodia and Hand in Hand Switzerland, with funding support from City of Geneva, launched the 'Strengthening Rural Women's Livelihood for Sustainable Economic Development' project in 2022. The aim of the project was to establish 75 new self-help groups (SHGs) with 900 members over 2 years. Focused on Kratie, a province in Cambodia with high levels of poverty, the project used the Self-Help Group Microfinance model for poverty alleviation in this region.

In this regard, the initiative included components such as the gathering of women into self-help groups, skill training, improving women's livelihood through a focus on business-to-business services and the market engagement process, and raising awareness among women, men, and youth in the community on gender, health, and the environment.

## Impact:

- 75 self-help groups created
- 1,289 members mobilised, including 125 men
- Business motivation training for 1,028 women group members
- 685 enterprises created
- 2,442 existing enterprises strengthened
- 953 women received skill training
- Training on women's rights and gender equality for 40 SHGs
- Training on environment, ecology, and plastics use for 16 SHGs
- Training on hygiene and disease prevention for 12 SHGs
- Total internal savings of 63 groups: USD 59,699.38 (as of August 2024)





# CASE Study

Ms. Yan Sopheak, aged 51, resides in Kor Lab village, Kratie province, Cambodia, with her and her family's primary occupation being cultivating vegetables at home and running vegetable market stalls within the provincial market.

Having joined the 'Kosh Andeitty3' Self Help Group (SHG) as a registered member, Yan receives additional technical guidance from Hand in Hand Switzerland and Hand in Hand Cambodia. This guidance encompasses agricultural techniques, financial management, vision development, and entrepreneurial skills, all aimed at enhancing her farming and business ventures. She is an active participant in the SHG and has managed to save CHF 707. Additionally, she obtained a loan of CHF 885 when initiating her business.

In her combined farming and market stall operations, Yan realised a profit of 5,962 CHF. She allocates some of these earnings to expand her business by purchasing land and supporting her children's education. Since joining the SHG and accessing loans to enhance her existing business, her family's economic prospects have further flourished.



## *Shallow Wells and Green Cover Development in Jawadhu Hills Range*

**Supported by:** Audemars-Watkins Foundation, Switzerland and co-funded by NABARD, India

**Location:** Tamil Nadu, India

The 'Shallow Wells and Green Cover Development in Jawadhu Hills Range' project being undertaken by Hand in Hand Switzerland in partnership with Audemars-Watkins Foundation, NABARD, and Hand in Hand India focuses on increasing the density of the Jawadhu Hills Forest in Tamil Nadu, India, through alternative irrigation methods for tribal farmers. Commenced in April 2022 for a period of 3 years, the project has 3 objectives, namely, creating 300 shallow wells as alternative irrigation sources; establishing 300 acres of horticulture plantations; and training 300 tribal farmers in water conservation, plantation maintenance, and joint forest management.

## Impact (as of September 2024):

- 213 shallow wells renovated
- 300 acres of horticulture land established, benefiting all 300 farmers
- Cumulative income of farmers increased from INR 44.13 lakhs to INR 58.88 lakhs post-project implementation
- Enhanced economic benefits through better land use and productivity
- Series of trainings organised focusing on agroforestry and horticulture to improve water resource management
- Tribal farmers participated in shallow well construction and received training from technical officers in Hand in Hand India
- Training sessions covered site preparation, pitting, plant selection, plantation techniques, manuring, watering, summer plant maintenance, and pruning
- Goal of such training: Promote sustainable growth and increased yields through effective plantation management





# CASE Study

Mr. Saminathan, a resident of Perathukollai village, adjacent to Nammiyampattu village in Jawadhu Hills, who is engaged in the agriculture sector, continually faced challenges with irrigation. These challenges included the regular collapse of the wall of the shallow well he dug near a river stream with his family's help, because of the region's topography and the porosity of the soil. To overcome this challenge, he needed INR 15,000.

This project paved the way for Saminathan to avail the much-needed support, because of which he was able to revive the well and use rough stone revetment for its wall, thereby helping avoid regular costs and improving safety. Saminathan has now taken up plantation crops such as pepper and silver oak, generating INR 80,000 in net income, an income level that is five times higher than before.



## *Skilling and Creating Enterprises to Strengthen Rural Women's Livelihood*

**Supported by:** Schöck-Familien-Stiftung and Humanium

**Location:** Maharashtra, India

In partnership with Schöck-Familien-Stiftung and Humanium, Hand in Hand Switzerland and Hand in Hand India have been undertaking a project titled 'Skilling and Creating Enterprises to Strengthen Rural Women's Livelihood' in 4 villages falling under the Khed block, in Pune district. Initiated in April 2023 for a period of 2 years, the initiative aims to benefit 200 women through skill development initiatives so as to create / strengthen enterprises in order to have their own source of income. The project thereby looks to disseminate knowledge on regular savings and record keeping, improving knowledge on enterprises development strategies, bringing about financial independence among women, while also enhancing their and their families' standards of living.

In line with this, women are provided skill training in the making of ready-to-eat products (candy, snacks, and savouries), incense sticks (agarbathi), dairy products (cottage cheese and clarified butter), herbal tea, spice masala powder, henna art (mehandi), and housekeeping products like phenyl. Women receive business development training and are taken on exposure visits to successful enterprises. The focus is also on the creation of family / group-based enterprises and the facilitation of market linkages / handholding support so as to ensure the sustenance of the enterprises.

Impact (as of December 2024):

- 15 module training sessions conducted for 202 women
- 15 digital financial literacy training sessions for 240 women
- 177 women received skill training in 8 different skills
- 20 business development training sessions for 319 women
- 5 exposure visits conducted for 78 women





## Climate Resilient Agriculture and Farming Techniques

**Supported by:** Collonge-Bellerive, NABARD, and Sandoz Family Foundation

**Location:** Tamil Nadu, India

As part of the main project titled 'Eapakkam Watershed Development and Management Project,' a project named 'Climate Resilient Agriculture and Farming Technique' is being undertaken, with Collonge-Bellerive, National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development (NABARD), and Sandoz Family Foundation as funding and co-funding partners, and is being implemented by Hand in Hand Switzerland and Hand in Hand India.

Implemented in the Viluppuram district, the project is being carried out for a period of 2 years, starting in 2024. Targeting small and marginal landholding farmers, the interventions aim to use climate-resilient agriculture practices to address the twin objectives of attaining food security and biodiversity restoration. As part of this effort, 100 farmers are transitioning from conventional farming methods to sustainable, climate-resilient techniques.

To attain the project's goals, the strategy focuses on the conversion of barren land into productive land with a green cover, cultivating Dragon Fruits and Perennial Red Gram. In particular, a flagship intervention is the introduction of dragon fruit cultivation in the Eappakkam, Nolampur, and Theevanur clusters, since this innovative initiative is a first for the region and aims to improve farmers' income levels by promoting high-value, climate-resilient crops.

#### Impact (as of November 2024):

- Comprehensive baseline survey undertaken with the 100 identified participating farmers, covering socio-economic conditions, and evaluated existing agricultural practices, water management methods, and awareness of climate-resilient techniques
- 100 soil and 25 water samples collected from farmers' fields and tested for key parameters
- 40 farmers received poles to install and plant dragon fruit saplings around
- 4 Farmers Field Schools established, offering structured training to farmers
- Automatic weather station installed in Nolambur, providing real-time weather data
- 100 participating farmers linked to Tindivanam Farmers Producer Company Limited





## **Empowering Rural and Tribal Communities with Comprehensive Health Camps, Health Awareness Campaigns, Screening and Treatment for Non Communicable Diseases (NCD), Upgrading Government Health Facilities and Nutrition Supply to Vulnerable People**

**Supported by:** Lonza

**Location:** Tamil Nadu, India

Funded by Lonza, Hand in Hand Switzerland and Hand in Hand India have been undertaking a 12-month project in multiple districts in Tamil Nadu. Ending on March 2025, the project is being implemented with the objective of providing access to quality and primary health services to vulnerable people through medical camps; enhancing awareness among women and adolescents on anaemia, Menstrual Hygiene Management (MHM), nutrition, personal hygiene, and sanitation; supporting government health facilities with essential medical equipment; preventing and controlling non-communicable diseases; and empowering vulnerable people to meet their basic nutritional needs independently by providing them with essential food items.

## Impact (as of December 2024):

- 54 general health camps benefitted 5,614 individuals
- 4 vision screening camps reached 231 beneficiaries
- 19 health awareness camps provided health promotion to women and adolescent girls, benefiting 1,632 individuals
- Prevention and control of non-communicable diseases through interventions that reached 11,696 beneficiaries
- Cyclone Fengal relief kits were provided to 700 families across 4 districts



# NEW PROJECTS





## Implementing Telemedicine Solutions for Enhanced Healthcare in Remote Tribal Communities

**Supported by:** J&K Wonderland Foundation

**Location:** Tamil Nadu, India

Hand in Hand Switzerland, along with J&K Wonderland Foundation and Hand in Hand India, is undertaking a new 12-month project 'Implementing Telemedicine Solutions for Enhanced Healthcare in Remote Tribal Communities' in Tamil Nadu, India. Tribal locations suffer from poor road connectivity, and people often walk several kilometres through the jungle to reach a motorable road, where they wait for a passing vehicle to take them to the nearest bus stop and then board a bus to the Primary Health Centre that often lacks sufficient staff, equipment, and essential drugs.

This project, therefore, is being undertaken with the objective of inculcating and improving the health-seeking behaviour among tribal communities. The project looks to reach 20,000 people across 640 sessions with telemedicine; 6,000 people through community-based non-communicable diseases (NCD) risk assessment training with the convergence government NCD programme; 960 people through NCD screening, referral, and speciality medical camp; 1,000 women and girls through anaemia control programme; and 500 youth and women through the lifesaving first aid training programme.



## **Residential Special Training Centre for Out-of-School Children's Education**

**Supported by:** Greengate Limited, Gibraltar

**Location:** Tamil Nadu, India

Hand in Hand Switzerland, in partnership with Greengate Limited, Gibraltar and Hand in Hand India, is to undertake a new project titled 'Residential Special Training Centre for Out of School Children's Education.' The project aims to provide access to quality education for 60 out-of-school children (never enrolled, dropouts, child labour, bonded labour, etc.) from underprivileged communities, in the Poongavanam Residential Special Training Centre (RSTC) at Kancheepuram district. These 60 boys receive not just academic support, but also boarding, lodging, and psychosocial assistance to address the challenges imposed by the intersectionality of their socio-economic conditions.



## Coastal Circularity

**Supported by:** Bellevue, Presinge, Lancy, Onex

**Location:** Tamil Nadu, India

The project aims to restore and preserve 45 kilometres of coastline and enhance circularity within the waste value chain by empowering informal waste pickers through skill-building and capacity development. 500 members – informal waste pickers, 55% of whom are women are to stand benefitted from this project.

The initiative looks to reduce marine litter through effective waste collection and recycling efforts along 45 kilometres of coastline by engaging informal waste pickers in a trustful, community-oriented initiative; advance circular waste management and increase the proportion of recyclable materials through comprehensive training for informal waste pickers in waste management, environmental education, financial literacy, health and safety conditions, and entrepreneurship; and restore, protect and preserve coastal ecosystems by empowering informal waste pickers as 'Recycle Guardians,' while promoting economic inclusion, gender equity, and community recognition, ultimately improving their livelihoods and social status.



## *STEM Education for Girls*

**Supported by:** Plan-les-Ouates

**Location:** Tamil Nadu, India

This intervention aims to promote STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) education among girl children studying in 20 government schools. The project seeks collaboration with Hand in Hand India, government education departments, local authorities, and educational experts.



### **Dr. Kalpana Sankar – President**

With a double doctorate, one in nuclear physics and another in gender studies, Dr. Kalpana Sankar has specialised in participatory assessment of Self Help Groups, NGOs, participatory rural appraisal, gender-differentiated impact, developing monitoring tools and indicators, and preparation of manuals / guidelines on gender issues for the past 20 years. She has handled several international missions and received special commendation from the United Nations Office for Project Services. Dr. Sankar has trained high-level government delegates from South Africa and Afghanistan and has supported microfinance and poverty reduction programmes in Afghanistan and Brazil. She has been a consultant to UNDP, UNOPS, Wetlands International, and Christian Aid. She was awarded the Nari Shakti Puraskar in 2017 and the Global Award for Women Empowerment from UN Women and the Kingdom of Bahrain.

Dr. Sankar is currently Chairperson of Hand in Hand India and Managing Director of Belstar Microfinance Private Ltd. She has received scholarships to attend the INSEAD Business School and HBS – ACCION programme and has been a student of the TRIUM E-MBA course. In 2009, she was felicitated by the US Congress as a leading Woman Social Entrepreneur in recognition of her role in providing leadership and fostering economic growth in local communities.
